The local police ran a poster competition for young people on the Wirral. Pupils had to design a poster to highlight the need to stop Hate Crimes and the pain and suffering they could cause.


Alexander Mannion (Year 10) produced a poster that attained third prize across all schools on the Wirral.

A message for our Chaplain Malcolm Kydd

In Collective Worship this half term we have been looking at the Christian Values of Compassion and Thankfulness. Compassion is about reaching out to those who are suffering or having a tough time; it's about action, a desire to change a bad situation, stepping out and making a difference. It's also about connecting with people and comforting them in their situations. This term we have seen compassion in action in our school community as we have collected for the Christians Against Poverty Christmas Hampers, seen the year 9s complete their Archbishop of York form challenges, and as we have begun our form charity fundraising events. Everyone has shown tremendous compassion and generosity in the way they've contributed – and thank you to everyone at home for your help and support in all of these things.

In December we have looked at our value of Thankfulness. We know that this has been a difficult year for many people, and that there are often times when we don't feel like thanking God (or anyone else) – when things are difficult, if times are hard, if we've lost someone close to us or if we feel lost or alone or angry. Thankfulness isn't about being happy or thankful because bad things are happening, but it nudges us to remember that whatever our circumstances, there will be something we can be thankful for – we can thank God for his love and commitment to us; for our health, our homes, our family

lies, friends, school and for the hope of eternal life.

Christmas is fast approaching and at a time when people are so generous it's especially important to make sure we are being thankful. Generosity isn't just about the amount of money someone spends on Christmas presents; generosity and selflessness are seen and shown in many different ways –

we should be thankful to the people who give us their time, their patience, and those who display kindness and thoughtfulness towards us, not just those that buy us gifts. Being thankful encourages us to think of all that we have, which puts everything into perspective a bit more. Gratitude and thankfulness lead to contentment and peace; if we're grateful for what we already have, we find that we're less urgently seeking to get more and

more, and we can be happy and content with what we have.

We received a letter of thanks from CAP Wirral saying that the donations from school enabled them to make 40 hampers for the families with financial issues that they support; in fact, there was so much generosity shown in the food donated from school that they had more than they needed and were able to use the excess to offer hampers to other churches across Wirral for families that they work with, and to give supplies to Charles Thompson's Mission in Birkenhead (which works with the homeless in the area). The families receiving the hampers were extremely thankful and felt very blessed by the generosity shown to them, and they all had huge smiles on their faces when they received their hampers.

As Christmas approaches, we pray that you will have plenty of things to be thankful for, and that you have a very blessed time as you celebrate together and remember the birth of our Saviour, Jesus, who came into the world to show God's great love for us.





Remembrance Day

The idea for the 'Woodchurch High School Dress of Remembrance', was born from a comment made by one of Our Year 7 pupils who asked if, "we would be able to sell and buy poppies this year in School?" Sadly, due to health and safety reasons, the answer was, "no". This then prompted Mrs Jones into thinking of another way that the school could remember and share thankfulness for the sacrifices made and for pupils individually to show personal messages of gratitude and thankfulness.

A poppy was cut for each pupil and member of staff in our community. Handwritten messages were added to the dress. 1300 poppies were then stitched and constructed onto our dress.

The dress then became a symbol of Hope and Remembrance, as pupils and staff continued to add personal messages. The dress stood proudly in the school foyer, with the waterfall of poppies cascading down the back.

It wasn't just pupils and staff from Woodchurch High School that were touched by the dress and those messages of Hope were 'shared' over 200 times on social media and the dress also featured in the local news.




Each poppy came with a small donation and over £300 was raised for Earl Haig Fund.

TREE OF HOPE

This year we are displaying a Tree of Hope in the school foyer. This is our celebration of Hope and Giving during this festive season. We have asked each pupil and every member of staff to write a personal message of their choice to show thankfulness, a memory of a loved one and / or wishes of Hope for the future. We also asked parents and carers to join our celebration by sending their comments too. All message have been added to the branches of the tree for all to see. Contributions were made by all involved and will be donated to our school's chosen charities for

this academic year.









This term, Year 7 students have been continuing to study the complex text of 'Oliver Twist' by Charles Dickens. They have progressed in the novel by completing character analysis of the Artful Dodger, the Noble Nancy and the Villainous Sikes. Students have refined their analysis skills by looking at how language can create an effective character.

Whilst reading Oliver Twist, students have been able identify and discuss the various Woodchurch Christian Values that are used throughout the novel and how they affect Oliver's life, including, trust, integrity, compassion, endurance and justice.



Students have also been creating descriptive settings using various language devices and descriptive techniques to create a convincing and detailed setting in preparation for their upcoming assessments.

Students will need to put their evaluation skills to the test in their assessment, judging how Dickens portrays his characters and the ways he persuades us to feel a certain way.

Pupils have also been developing their descriptive writing skills, looking at how to write using the 5 senses, similes and metaphors, and personification to name a few!

It's been a tough first term, Year 7, but you have made an excellent start! Congratulations!

Year 8

This half term, Year 8 have been exploring the horrifying landscape of Eel Marsh House in Susan Hill's *The Woman in Black*. They have been delving into the depths of the marshes in order to gain inspiration for their own creative writing.

They have been learning how to write their own gothic settings using ambitious adjectives and figurative language such as metaphors, similes and personification. Year 8 have also been enjoying creating their own gothic characters and dipping their toes into the world of the supernatural. Ahead of their assessment at the end of term, they have also been learning all about how to structure short stories and build tension in their writing just like Hill does in *The Woman in Black*.




So far this term, Year 9 have worked incredibly hard studying either John Steinbeck's *Of Mice and Men*, or Harper Lee's *To Kill A Mockingbird*. Through their study of each of these texts, Year 9 have analysed many meaningful and currently relevant topics; including racism, sexism and the treatment of those less fortunate. Year 9 have been looking at these issues through both the lens of each novel, and through the lens of our own Christian Values.

Once reading of these novels was wrapped up, Year 9 began looking at the War Poetry from the Eduqas Poetry Anthology as inspiration for their own narrative writing, which will be part of their exam in the first week back to school in January. Pupils have enjoyed studying



Moving forward, Year 9 need to be practising Language 1 techniques in preparation for their centre assessed examinations in January. This includes 'What impressions' questions, 'How does the writer' questions and 'To what extent do you agree" questions. All of these can be found in your English PLC booklet. Using the Google Classroom facilities, your teacher will be able to send you some example papers to practise. Practice makes perfect, after all!







Year 10 are well underway in their studies of the first GCSE text, Shakespeare's 'Macbeth'. Pupils have explored the various themes from the play in depth that include ambition, morality, guilt and manipulation to name a few. Year 10 have been using their Learning Guides to support their fantastic ideas, which have proven to be a great success!

Students have had countless debates within lessons surrounding the characters and key events within the play. They have engaged well with some of the violent and immoral actions we encounter within it, sharing their unique and interesting takes on the actions



of these complex characters - particularly the controversial Lady Macbeth!

Year 10 have been very committed to their studies in English, being conscientious in their revision which met with a fantastic turn out to Saturday College, hosted by Miss Griffiths and Miss Smethurst. This reflected in their first examinations for English that took place in the week commencing the 23 rd November, where students came out of the exam feeling confident in their knowledge of the play and responses to the two extract questions.

Year 10 have made an excellent start to their GCSE studies and the department would like

to thank all students for their resilience during this tough exam period.

Year 10 are now moving into their next phase of study; The Eduqas Poetry Anthology. This is an exciting opportunity for students to explore poetry from sonnets - first discovered in the 13th century - to the contemporary. Students are given the opportunity to explore themes of Romanticism, conflict and war, industrialisation and modernism in the Anthology.



As the Autumn term comes to an end, Year 11 are continuing to work hard towards their GCSEs in English Language and Literature. Moving on from Language Component 1 and all their non-fiction writing, Year 11 are now focused on learning about J.B.Priestley's *An Inspector Calls* and refining their knowledge of Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* in Period 6 lessons. However, pupils should continue to practise non-fiction writing tasks in their revision to continue to develop their skills.





Pupils are engaging well with the themes of social responsibility and compassion prevalent in each of these texts, particularly in the current climate of Covid-19. The transformation of Scrooge from a selfish miser to a compassionate, friendly gentleman is just the heart-warming tale we all need in the run up to Christmas. And Priestley's message is crucial too: we all must look after each other and think of more than ourselves for a just society. Year 11 are increasingly enthusiastic about these stories and themes, which will serve them well when it comes to revision.

Speaking of revision, now is the time when we encourage Year 11 pupils to engage with regular revision of English, both Language and Literature, to ensure all knowledge is fully embedded for their exams. To achieve this, revision guides and copies of the set texts are available to purchase from the English Department and we have a number of recommended revision tools detailed on the Student Intranet, such as flashcards, concept maps, condensed notes and mnemonics. Also on the Student Intranet, pupils can find a range of videos and other resources to help with revision of each set text and component of the English GCSEs. Pupils can access these on computers, tablets and even their phones!

Year 11 will sit their first round of centre assessed examinations on the second week in January with a focus on Language. It is important that pupils are revising Language over the break, especially those fabulous stories they will have to write! Remember, your teachers will be able to share any resources with you that you feel you will need to support you.



This half-term Year 7 have continued with their study of drama through the exploration of Theatre History! Pupils have moved from looking at the origins of theatre in Ancient Greece to looking at more modern aspects of theatre like Pantomime. Pupils have really enjoyed considering key features of this performance style and using exaggeration, comedy and direct address to bring to life their melodramatic characters! Well Done, Year 7!




Year 8



This half-term Year 8 have continued with their exploration of Darkwood Manor! From exploring different methods to create tension and considering theatre practitioners like Antonin Artaud pupils have then worked to create their own devised performances. These performances have included key elements of Artaud's theatre of cruelty as pupils aimed to terrify their audiences using techniques such as audience involvement, animalistic movement and soundscape.

Year 9

Year 9 have made continued to work on their understanding of War and Conflict, exploring different stimuli that links to several real world issues. Pupils found learning about 9/11 incredibly interesting and have been considering the Syrian Refugee Crisis, developing compassion for people in such situations.




Year 10 have continued to develop their knowledge of different theatre practitioners this half-term and have looked at the playwright Mark Wheeler. Pupils have loved exploring his play, *Missing Dan Nolan*. Based on a true story Mark explores the tale of fifteen year old Dan's disappearance through the words of his friends and family. Pupils have worked to consider how they might stage the play as a performer, director and designer. Their mock exams showed really engagement with the story and we can't wait to see how they further develop these skills next term with our next exam text, Dennis Kelly's *DNA*.



Year 11

Year 11 have completed their practical performance for Component 1 of their GCSE and performed brilliantly! They explored ideas around Fairytale and Imagination and developed stories exploring real world issues like gender stereotyping, narcissistic relationships and body image. Pupils' performances were incredibly moving to watch and really encouraged us, as an audience, to consider different perspectives.

Year 11

Year 11 have been revisiting Paper 1 knowledge in lessons, completing the Living world section. In Period 6, we have been looking at the 'Global resources' topic and how the development gap can be reduced.



We've been getting stuck in this half term! From enquiry-based learning at Key Stage Three to preparing for exams at Key Stage Four, our Historians have been very busy. Our mission is to help our students to understand our world and find their place in it.

Year 7

Year 7 students have begun an enquiry that answers a very big question - *Why did William win the Battle of Hastings?* Arguably one of the most significant events in history of our nation, the Battle of Hastings opened the door to a new age of feudalism, castles and one of life's great certainties - taxes! Our students are discovering the nature of medieval kingship and the rise and rapid demise of Harold II - king for just nine months.

This half term has seen the launch of the RS Google Site. This is a fantastic resource with a wealth of information and resources. For Years 10 and 11, as well as all of our revision guides on the site, we have a recorded lesson for every sub-topic of the GCSE course. This is a great way for pupils to revise, as well as helping them to catch up on any work missed due to absence. For KS3 pupils all our PLCs and knowledge organisers are on the site and we will be working on recorded lessons over the next few months. We would encourage all pupils and parents /carers to have a look round and familiarise themselves with the site which can be accessed through the school's website by clicking on - Pupil Intranet-Subject areas-Religious Studies.

Pupils have been working hard this half term. Year 7 have been completing the Christianity Learning programme and have enjoyed looking at Christian practices such as Pilgrimage and Festivals. Year 8 have continued with their Faith in Action Learning Program, where they have studied how individuals such as Mother Teresa and Martin Luther King have put their faith, and indeed our Christian Values into action. Year 9 are just coming to the end of the Environment Learning Programme, in which they have really enjoyed looking at very important issues, such as Climate Change and Animal Rights, and how Christians and Humanists respond to them. 

Pupil Voice

Both KS3 and KS4 students were given an opportunity to use Pupil Voice and communicate their feelings toward maths lessons at Woodchurch High School. Despite the difficulties presented by the current climate; an overwhelming number of students have felt that they have settled back into school, learning and using Hegarty Maths.

79% of KS4 students report that Hegarty Maths has helped them to become more independent learners.

89% of KS3 students reported that the Do Now tasks have been helpful to them in remembering key information and concepts.


Year 8 Computing

Year 8 pupils are developing their coding skills by programming their own car racing games using Scratch. Pupils have been making sure their games are as exciting as possible by programming lap counters, timers and speed reduction features if a player goes off the race track. In doing so, students are developing key skills in problem solving which will help shape them into tomorrow's Computer Scientists.

BTEC IT

Students studying BTEC IT have been completing a piece of coursework designing a touch screen interface which could be placed in a stadium to show people where the faculties are. They have had to think about how easy to use their system is, making sure that it is accessible for people with disabilities or other special needs. They have also had to think about a colour scheme and house style for the interface so that it is consistent as well as recording page instructions that could be read out.



- 2. **BBC.co.uk/languages** select '**Spanish**' in the '**Choose your language box**' then click on '**Mi Vida Loca**' to watch the 22 episodes of the interactive video drama.
- 3. **Quizlet.com** search for **mflwoodchurch**. Scroll down the list of activities to find topic areas to revise. The 'gravity' game is particularly addictive.
- 4. **Teachvid.com** sign up for a free account watch the language videos and try some of the interactive activities.
- 5. **bbc.co.uk/bitesize** select secondary then KS3 or GCSE, Modern Foreign Languages then either French or Spanish. Quizzes, videos and interactive exercises on a range of topics, including all those at GCSE (we follow the **AQA specification**).
- 6. 'Easy Languages' channel on YouTube select either Easy French or Easy Spanish. Subtitles available in the foreign language and English. Good way to develop listening skills and build a wider range of vocabulary.
- 7. 'Comme une Française' channel on YouTube practise pronunciation, learn phrases on a wide range of topics and improve your knowledge of French culture.
- 8. 'Agencia ELE' channel on YouTube Spanish videos on a range of GCSE topics. Subtitles can be turned off and on through the settings button at the bottom of the video screen.
- 9. **1 jour 1 actu.com** current affairs website aimed at young, native speakers of French.

Pupils began with an outline plan of the design and Fletcher took the lead of project manager. A decision was made on what materials would be used and pupils set to work foraging in the wooded area for natural resources. After four wheelbarrow loads of leaves and logs taken from the ground pupils set to work with the display. Large branches were placed in a circular arrangement and Sam, Emma and Fletcher began filling the middle with leaves. Remote Learning

At the end of the last academic year, we notified pupils and parents of the exciting plans that were underway for eLearning at Woodchurch, including developments with G-Suite for Education.

G-Suite for Education is a suite of tools/apps, available through Google, to increase opportunities for thinking, communication, collaboration, and creativity, whilst supporting the delivery of our curriculum and day-to-day lessons.

After a term's introduction, we can say with confidence that these tools are relevant to pupils, easy to use, and are opening doors to many new ways to learn. They offer:

- 24/7 access, meaning pupils and staff can work;
- access on any device, including phones, tablets, laptops, computers even gaming devices:
- one login for everything, meaning pupils do not have to remember countless passwords;
- opportunities for collaboration in the classroom and in a virtual/remote setting.

We have remained committed to providing continuity of education to pupils this term through G-Suite, and it has had a crucial role to play in terms of our provision.

Live Lessons

Since September, we have been able to deliver lessons to pupils in real time as per curriculum and lesson plans. This has been enabled by *Google Classroom*, *Google Meet*, and *GMail*, and has been necessary where pupils or staff have been isolating.

Pupils have attended lessons remotely, completing the work as they would do in school, using a chat function to liaise with teaching staff, and submitting their work, in accordance with the instruction given by their class teacher.

This has meant that pupils are involved in the learning experience, able to follow their timetable, have access to teacher support and crucially, are not missing out on any more learning opportunities.

We have received some really positive feedback from parents and pupils about this provision and training remains underway, as we look to improve our practice.


Pre-recorded Lessons
