Pupils have developed their images from a series of drawings and photographs of their pets and our farm animals. Below are some examples of the work in progress.



Located in the heart of our school building, our new glass bubble is a heavenly haven for

book lovers and offers pupils some solitude during busy school days. Stocked with a whole world of exciting stories, pupils can browse our A-Z of fiction and pick out their favourites. We have a plethora of authors, from David Walliams to J.K Rowling or, if pupils prefer the classics, Austen and Dickens. If that's not enough, there's a selection of smaller reads that will take mere minutes to get through.

Our shelves are stacked with an array of poetry, plays and short stories, sections on self-help and character.

For pupils who prefer non-fiction, there's a huge variety of non-fiction helpfully sorted into subjects to support pupils with learning and revision. The fun isn't restricted to our shelves, we have a set of Kindles which offer subscriptions to services including *Audible* and *Kindle Unlimited* so there's an even wider world of books at the finger-tips of pupils! If pupils can't find their favourites, they are wel-



come to speak to their English teacher, who can arrange for books to be ordered for them to rent and read.

Our new self-check scanner makes it really simple for pupils to check books out and all they need to do is pop them on the trolley when they wish to return them.

We've made it easier than ever to engage with reading and we can't wait to see pupils enjoying, and reaping the benefits of our new provision!



This half term, Year 7 have continued to explore our topic of Nature and the Environment and have been getting to grips with non-fiction texts. They have explored news articles, letters and documentaries and have delved into discussions surrounding animal rights, the environment and looking after our planet.

Fresh out of their adventures in the wonderful wild world of nonfiction, Year 7 have been exploring their theme of Nature and the Environment through poetry since their return to school. They have discovered famous poets such as William Blake, Ted Hughes and Alfred Lord Tennyson and have made waves in developing their poetry analysis skills. We have developed a brand new Anthology especially for Year 7, and pupils have thrived in analysing these.

Don't forget that The Foyle Young Poets of the Year Award 2021 is now accepting entries, so if you enjoyed your study of poetry this term, why not try your hand at penning your own, in the hope of winning a certificate of success in this prestigious award! There is a link to enter on the homepage of the English site.

Next term, Year 7 will be reading William Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet and exploring the themes of Love and Relationships. Over the Easter break, Year 7 would benefit from learning about the Bard himself, such as his other plays and key facts about his life. They would also benefit from watching a version of the play and discussing the characters, themes and events at home.

Year 8

This term, Year 8 have moved onto a new theme, Love and Relationships, and have been discussing the Big Question: Sometimes it's not about who loves you most, it's who loves you best; what is love?

In this programme, Year 8 have been studying family relationships, including parent and child. They have been exploring this through studying 'Much Ado About Nothing' by William Shakespeare. Pupils have enjoyed the play's hilarity, drama and chaos, and have successfully engaged with the extracts in the style of GCSE questions.

During their study of the play, pupils have been considering what familial love is, and how people show this. They have also considered romantic love, deception and reconciliation. We have also discussed the difficulties that come with relationships, and how ups and downs can be an integral part of all of our relationships.

After the Easter break, pupils will be studying the renowned play 'Bloody Brothers'. Those who want to get ahead might want to look into the history of Liverpool during the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s. They should also be researching and revising dramatic techniques to support them with reading a new play.

Year 8 will also continue with their poetry studies, in preparation for their trial exams in the Summer term.



This half-term, Year 9 have continued their study of Robert Swindell's 'Stone Cold'. Year 9 have tackled complex societal issues, such as homelessness and neglect, whilst also honing their extract writing skills.

Year 9 have focused on the importance of a dual narrative, analysing the plot from the perspective of our two main characters; the downtrodden Link, and the mysterious Shelter.



Through their study of 'Stone Cold', Y9 have delved deeper into our Christian Values, in particular compassion and endurance. Year 9 have used the analytical skills fostered before Christmas (in their study of 'Of Mice and Men') to complete extract analysis and 'exploding essays'.


As their knowledge of the novel and its context grows, Year 9 will be learning to create an 'exploding essay', which will allow them to focus on key extracts from the novel, whilst also integrating their knowledge from the entirety of 'Stone Cold'. This style of essay writing will emulate their GCSE texts, 'A Christmas Carol' and 'An Inspector Calls' which pupils will begin studying in Year 10.

Year 9's study of 'Stone Cold' has given them a new appreciation for some of society's downtrodden and vulnerable, and will no doubt support them in their study of 'The Crucible' next term!

Year 9 should also now be beginning to explore a variety of new writing techniques, such as dual narrative, and should be solidifying their understanding of both first and third person narration.



This term since being back in school, Year 10 have been continuing their studies which form part of their literature component one; the Edugas Poetry Anthology. The students had the opportunity over lockdown to begin exploring the vast collection of exciting poetry within the anthology, ranging from the era of Romanticism in the 18th and 19th centuries with poems such as 'London' by William Blake and 'The Prelude' by William Wordsworth along with war and conflict poetry from Wilfred Owen with 'Dulce Et Decorum Est' to Rupert Brooke's 'The Soldier'. Students have been learning a multiplicity of themes in the anthology and this half-term, the students have started postwar poetry which includes poems such as 'Valentine' by Carol Ann Duffy and 'Cozy Apologia' by Rita Dove. While navigating their way through the anthology, students have produced some excellent analysis of the poems and have started to explore how these poems can be compared through their various themes, language and structure in preparation for their GCSE assessments. They have also learnt the



contextual knowledge of the poems and the history of the poetic eras, along with becoming experts at analysis!

Year 10 have also kept their studies of Macbeth ongoing, with Macbeth Mondays underway each week. Now that they have completed the play, students have been able to focus on the complexity of the characters and the various themes of conflict, love, ambition and betrayal in the play in greater depth in preparation for their GCSE examinations next summer.

Year 10 have returned to school with a fantastic attitude to their learning and anthologies filled with annotations to further develop and support their learning. Over the last few weeks, the students have produced some excellent work and in-class discussion about the various poems in the anthology and have been engaging well with the complex and diverse nature of them. Well done, Year 10!

Since returning to school, Year 11 have been focused on their English Centre Assessed Examinations, particularly their Literature papers. Starting with Unseen Poetry and ending with An Inspector Calls, Year 11 have been using their expert knowledge of the texts to analyse and explain the presentation of specific characters in their essay responses. Year 11 have shown a great commitment to their revision and classwork, and are eager to prove what they have learnt in English since starting at Woodchurch High School nearly 5 years ago.



Following the Easter break, Year 11 will be undertaking their GCSE Language Component 1 and 2 CAEs. Therefore, it is essential that pupils engage fully in the revision materials and resources provided by the English Department to effectively prepare. Flashcards will be provided for pupils to plan their responses and write plans to be taken into the exam; pupils should take full advantage of this opportunity to allow them to demonstrate their learning in English throughout their education.

The English Department would like to congratulate Year 11 on their hard work so far and wish them happy studying in advance of their Language CAEs!




WHS Audio Library









Year 11

Humanities

Religious Studies

This half term the RS Subject Area had their assessment for the REQM award. This is the Religious Education Quality Mark and lots of hard work and preparation went into getting ready for the assessment. Pupils had their say about RS via pupil voice surveys which were submitted to the assessor, along with examples of their work, our learning programmes and other key documentation. We were absolutely delighted to have been awarded the Gold level or the award, the highest level of the award, with some excellent feedback from our assessor. We feel this award recognises not only the hard work and dedication of our RS teachers but also the excellent work and achievements of our pupils. Well done everybody!



In March, Mrs Wilton organised an fantastic experience for some of our Year 9 pupils, a live webinar with a Holocaust survivor through the Holocaust Education Trust and Liverpool Hope University. Pupils were able to listen to the remarkable story of Mr Harry Kessler who survived the Holocaust due to the random acts of kindness of his parents and strangers which eventually led him to safety in the UK. Our pupils were excellent, listening to Mr Kessler with fascination and admiration and asked some very thought-provoking and meaningful questions. Well done Year 9 and thank you Mrs Wilton for organising.

This half term Year 7 and 8 have been completing their study of St Mark's Gospel, really building on their skills of textual analysis and evaluation. We have been impressed with the endurance our pupils have shown while studying this learning programme and with the knowledge they have gained about St Mark and the life and teachings of Jesus.

Year 9 have been completing their Evil and Suffering Learning Programme and have really enjoyed looking at some very typical issues such as the death penalty, punishment and forgiveness. They have shown a real level of maturity which is really promising as they prepare to study GCSE RS next academic year.

Our Year 10 pupils have really enjoyed beginning their study of Judaism. Next half term they will all be involved in a webinar with a member of the Jewish community. This is an excellent opportunity for them to find out more about the everyday life of Jewish people and the role of the Synagogue, both in terms of worship and supporting the local community.





Religious Studies

Year 11 Pupils are working hard to prepare for their exams after the Easter break. For Religious Studies, pupils will sit two papers, comprising of the three GCSE Learning Programmes they have studied since Year 9:

Paper 1 Wednesday 5th May - Philosophy and Ethical Issues in the Modern World (Relationships, Life and Death, Good and Evil and Human Rights) - 2 Hours

Paper 2 Friday 7th May - Christianity and Judaism - 1 hour. For this paper, pupils should focus their revision specifically on: Christianity: Key words, Christmas, Jesus' Crucifixion, Pilgrimage and other forms of worship Judaism: Key words, Shabbat, The Messiah, Mitzvot and Pikuach Nefesh.

We wish our Year 11s every success with these exams and, as always, all the RS teachers are here to support pupils with revision and the preparation for these important exams.



Our Historians have done exceptionally well in adjusting back to face-to-face learning, and we've been covering some really exciting topics.

Our **Year 7s** are tackling a thorny question - were medieval kings as powerful as they wanted to be? They will focus on the power of the Church and the grisly murder of Thomas Becket in Canterbury Cathedral, King John and the Magna Carta, and will evaluate the extent of the destruction caused by the Black Death. Year 8 are continuing to investigate 17th century events in England. They have evaluated whether Oliver Cromwell was a hero or a villain, and will study his legacy - did life in England improve after the execution of Charles I? It's been great to see how our Year 8s' literacy is improving as they tackle some extended reading and writing tasks. Year 9 have been working towards an assessment about Hitler's rise to power - how could people have voted for such a man? Next they will be learning about his rule in Germany, with a particular focus on his use of terror to ensure obedience. This will culminate in a study of the Holocaust. Year 10 have worked really hard to recap the learning completed over lockdown. We are preparing for an assessment on our Germany paper in the Summer term - the current focus is life under Hitler. Year 10 are becoming more confident with their exam technique and are responding to feedback really well. Year 11 are studying hard, preparing for their centre assessments - they have two coming up:

Paper 1 Thursday 1st April - USA - 45 minutes

We will cover two Key Questions:

- Civil Rights, 1941-1970
- Political Change, 1960-2000

Paper 2 Thursday 6th May - Germany - 45 minutes

We will cover three Key Questions:

- Impact of the First World War
- Recovery of Weimar
- End of the Weimar Republic

Pupils have all been given a hard copy of revision guides to help them to prepare, and I would ask that you encourage them to use it to create revision resources such as concept maps, flash cards, mnemonics or condensed notes. They must also practice their exam technique - they have been given guidance for this too.

Casio calculators are available to purchase from the maths base priced at £8. They represent good value for a calculator that will see most students through to GCSE and A'levels.



To support their progress, pupils can access a range of key grammar and topic resources via our MFL Google Site. One way Year 11 can challenge themselves at home would be by continuing to revise the 'Hub Phrases', 'Booster Verbs' and the key tenses. Pupils are currently being provided with condensed knowledge organisers for each GCSE 'Theme' and are encouraged to use these to support their revision.



Pupils can also use online websites such as DuoLingo, Memrise and Quizlet to revise vocabulary. Practice exam questions are also available on BBC Bitesize which has been updated, and any other support needed pupils should ask their MFL teacher. Revision guides are still available to order from the MFL staff base.

Google Classroom: Homework



The MFL department are now using Google Classroom as the main hub for setting homeworks. While vocabulary and homework materials will be uploaded to Classroom, students should still continue to bring their vocabulary books to lessons as they will still need these for certain resources.

Home Learning and Revision

- Seneca is an online platform that is great for revising your language skills.

- **Quizlet.com** search for **mflwoodchurch**. Scroll down the list of activities to find topic areas to revise. The 'gravity' game is particularly addictive.
- Teachvid.com sign up for a free account watch the language videos and try some of the interactive activities.
- bbc.co.uk/bitesize select secondary then KS3 or GCSE, Modern Foreign Languages then either French or Spanish. Quizzes, videos and interactive exercises on a range of topics, including all those at GCSE (we follow the AQA specification).
- **'Easy Languages'** channel on YouTube select either **Easy French** or **Easy Spanish**. Subtitles available in the foreign language and English. Good way to develop listening skills and build a wider range of vocabulary.
- **'Comme une Française**' channel on YouTube practise pronunciation, learn phrases on a wide range of topics and improve your knowledge of French culture.
- 'Agencia ELE' channel on YouTube Spanish videos on a range of GCSE topics. Subtitles can be turned off and on through the settings button at the bottom of the video screen.
- **1 jour 1 actu.com** current affairs website aimed at young, native speakers of French.
- **Lyricstraining.com** no need to set up a free account. Practise listening skills by completing gap fill exercises on French or Spanish songs. (Start with 'Beginner' and 'Choice mode'.

Fit for Life

The PE Department is promoting 'Fit for Life' to encourage pupils to engage in sport and exercise both inside and outside of school. Each year group has a night for their extracurricular activities which offers a fitness based option such as Body Attack fitness classes or using the gym; a recreational option with their friends like badminton or table tennis and then the competitive sports options like netball, basketball and football.

There is also a 'WoodchuchPE' group on the exercise app Strava, to encourage pupils to join and log runs or cycles outside of school and to connect with friends virtually through exercises.

The sole aim is to allow pupils to see that by engaging in sport and exercise, it will make a positive impact on their physical health, but also their emotional wellbeing such as improved confidence and self esteem and finally their social health by making new friendships.

Future Food Challenge - Farm Urban STEM Challenge

Year 9 pupils have been lucky enough to be working alongside Farm Urban to learn all about Aquaponics and how to solve problems related to food shortages in the future. All Year 9 pupils have participated in the Future Food Festival, completing

online sessions all about fixing the Broken Food System and Improving Health.

12 pupils are now involved in learning more about setting up a business and the science behind aquaponics, working on the Future Food project to design, develop and make their own produce pod and business model.

Pupils are currently developing their business around environmentally friendly ways of producing fresh, sustainable food, while reducing food miles and being able to access fresh salad, vegetables and herbs all year around without relying on the use of supermarkets.



Our two new fish will be joining us after the Spring Break and they will be working just as hard as our pupils to make the project a real success. The waste, ammonia produced by the fish is converted into nitrates by special bacteria in the produce pod, this is then used by the plants as food to help them grow! We hope to design a produce pod that could be used within our school canteen so everyone can access the food that we produce.





Fairtrade Fortnight Success

During the enforced closure, the Year 9 Eco Committee continued to meet remotely and planned a highly successful programme for Fair Trade Fortnight to raise awareness inequalities in trading across the world & to raise money for the Fairtrade Foundation, who support workers in developing Countries and campaign for a fair income for their work. We ran a sell out Fairtrade Tuckshop and raised £40.00. A highly successful Fair Trade Cupcake Competition offered the chance for our pupils to showcase their independent baking and decorating skills!

Upon returning to School full time, the Year 9 Eco Committee have been completing audits with the prospect of achieving the Fair Aware Award, our first step into becoming a Fair Trade School in the future! As part of our assessment, Miss Hughes (Eco Coordinator) invited members of the Year 7



Eco Committee to participate in a 'tough choices' challenge in which they performed in teams and managed their essential living expenses under substandard and discriminating wages. The aims of this activity were to raise awareness of inequalities occurring across our World.



Bike To School Week

Bike to School Week is a week long/termly activity that takes place across the UK to showcase the benefits of cycling to School.

Our first BTSW of the year took place from Monday 22nd - Friday 26th March. There were prizes given every day to a member of each year and it was delightful to hear that so many pupils taking to cycling to School for the first time to support this campaign!



Since 1979, numbers of many species have been declining. The Big Garden Birdwatch helps the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) to find out which species are struggling, identify why and how they can be protected. This family activity is also recommended for boosting wellbeing.

Some of our pupils participated in the Garden Bird Watch in their own gardens! Their collection of data will raise awareness of bird species that are identified as endangered and we will continue to address how we can help them.



Reasebeath Project

This term pupils have returned to Westlake as part of their Reaseheath land based studies programme. Their enthusiasm in their learning has been demonstrated in the outcomes of what they have produced. Emma, Fletcher and Sam were shown the skill of how to use willow to create an obelisk. After taking several attempts and their full strength to weave the willow between the stakes the obelisks are now ready to be used for their sweet peas which were prepared by sandpapering the sweet pea seeds and planted during their horticulture studies.

To encourage wildlife pupils have also been busy building bird feeders using logs, a mixture of lard and bird seed which became a very sticky lesson!

The changes in the spring season enabled pupils to continue and expand their knowledge with land based activities such as revisiting the study of tree recognition using leaves, blossom and bark and photographs have been taken to show the changes surrounding the environment in which we are working in, after a few weeks photographs will be taken again to compare the changes to the landscape. Pupils have also looked at new life in the ponds such as frogspawn and pond newts.

Again the skills and knowledge learned will be transferred to inform younger pupils involved on our school farm.








Archbishop of York Award

Woodchurch High School Farm has received over £21,000 of the Metro Mayor, Steve Rotherams's and the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Community Environment Fund. The funding will be used to launch the following two environmental projects: The Young Farmers Experience and The Good Life Happy Earth Project.

The Young Farmers Experience will be aimed at opening the WHS Farm to primary schools around the Liverpool City Region so that children can learn about environmental issues and take part in activities such as an Eco Safari and Eco workshops including Farm to Fork and Grow 4 Life planting experience. The visits will culminate in an Eco Poster Competition based on their learning on the school farm.

The Good Life Happy Earth Project is aimed at the wider community. We will be offering workshops on how to 'Grow your Own' from vegetables in a large raised bed to a windowsill allotment. The aim is to promote awareness of environmental issues and how to reduce our carbon footprint. We will also be using everyday items to make a community 'Pick and Mix' area outside the farm entrance. This area will have vegetables growing to help yourself on the way past the farm. We will have a seed and plant share area, where the farm and community can deposit spare seeds and plants for all to share for free. Many more activities, events and opportunities are planned and will be announced soon.
