On Wednesday 10th May, parents and guardians of Year 9 pupils were invited in to celebrate their child's success. The staff at Woodchurch nominated pupils to receive an award for their hard work and ethic, outstanding contribution to the school and ability to live by our school Christian Values, showcasing their gifts and talents and letting their light shine.

During the assembly, we were entertained by two performances - 'Bohemian Rhapsody' and ' Viva la Vida'. Those fortunate enough to be at the assembly will agree how outstanding these performances were! Over the last few weeks in Collective Worship we've been looking at Encounters with Jesus. We've seen how four very different people encountered Jesus in the Bible, and we've seen the impact of that meeting on those individuals and on the people around them. We met a religious leader called Nicodemus who saw something in Jesus that no one else did and wanted to know more; his encounter meant that he was brave enough to risk his livelihood to speak up for Jesus when everyone else shouted against him, and then generous to give Jesus' body a proper burial after his crucifixion. We met a lady who was a social outcast, who had a conversation with Jesus that showed her that he was the promised Saviour sent by God; this encounter gave her the compulsion to go back to her village and tell everyone about this amazing man who she'd met who had changed her life.

Next, we met a rich young man – he was morally upright, and spiritually sincere; he followed all of the religious laws and sought from Jesus how he might get to heaven; in his encounter with Jesus, Jesus shows him that despite his goodness, kindness and rule-following, he has other priorities before God – he is challenged to put God first, and to love God more than anything else in the world. The final person we met is a tax collector called Zacchaeus, someone who would have been scorned by his fellow countrymen for his behaviour and his allegiance with the ruling powers – but in his encounter with Jesus he finds acceptance and forgiveness, and it causes him to change his ways and make reparations to those he had wronged.

All Christians have their own story of how they first encountered Jesus, and how encounters with Jesus have changed their life. At 7pm on the first Sunday of each month at St Mary's Church Upton, we hear the story of someone who has had their life changed by an encounter with Jesus; some of our guests are celebrities, others are local heroes. On Sunday 4th June we'll be hearing the story of Lauren Windle; Lauren is an author, journalist, presenter and public speaker, but her proudest achievement in her life (so far) is to get clean from cocaine and sober from alcohol addiction. Lauren's newly founded Christian faith and the support of exceptional friends in a local church has given her fresh focus and purpose in life. We'd like to invite you to come and hear more of her story and journey of recovery on Sunday 4th June at 7pm, with light refreshments beforehand from 6:30pm.

We may think that we are very different from some of the people we know, that God might not want to bother with us because we're not as clever, funny, successful or kind as other people. But Jesus wants to meet us ALL. The gift he has to offer us is for everyone, every single one.



Year 11 Residential—Glan-Lyn



Twenty Year 11 pupils were selected to attend the two-night English Residential on Friday 5th May with Ms Griffiths, Miss Barney, Ms Calder, Miss Warrington and Mr Emmitt. They stayed at the Glan-Lyn Activity Centre in the beautiful surroundings of Bala Lake. Pupils completed 17 hours of English Language and English Literature revision, covering all aspects of the impending assessments.

The aim of the weekend was to support pupils with useful strategies to revise their Literature content, focusing on key quotations and vocabulary they could use for different

characters and build confidence. They looked at the themes of conflict and location in poetry, compassion in 'A Christmas Carol,' social justice in 'An Inspector Calls' and watched some of King Charles' coronation to help them understand the idea of kingship in 'Macbeth.'

In the evenings, pupils had use of the centre's own bowling alley and they watched films with staff. Their behaviour and endurance was exemplary and we wish them every success for their exams.







Open Evening

During our second Open Evening of the year, prospective pupils from surrounding primary schools visited the English Department to learn about the different texts and topics studied by our KS3 pupils. Every member of staff and all our pupil helpers were on their best behaviour ready to welcome visitors to the department and engage them in the activities on offer. There was a Shakespeare room where visitors had the opportunity to learn about words made up by Shakespeare and to create their own witch's potion; the poetry room where pupils could make up their own nature-themed poems and match up key quotes to illustrative images for some of our GCSE poems; a room focused on *Blood Brothers* including an activity matching up 'scouse slang' with Standard English translations; also a room about *The Crucible* where visitors had to decide who the real witch was from a group of characters.

The whole department would like to thank our pupil helpers for their hard work and professionalism on such an important evening for the school.

The Reader - Celebrating 10 years of literature together

We are delighted to share the news that this academic year marks 10 years of the partnership between Woodchurch High School and The Reader.

Thanks to the immense logistical wizardry of Mrs Goaten in the English department, we run Shared Reading groups on Tuesdays and Thursdays with Year 7 pupils. Shared Reading is a bit like having a collective brain, where everyone in the room works through the story or poem together. There's no pressure for anyone to read aloud if they don't want to and we stop every couple of pages to share our thoughts. We have some wild, eclectic conversations from our favourite chocolate bars to sentient alien life. If you're reading this from Year 6 or 7, maybe you'll be joining me for a Shared Reading group soon!

What few people know is how this partnership is part of a wider, growing picture. The Reader are a national charity that wants to bring about a Reading Revolution, so that everyone can experience and enjoy great literature, which we believe is a tool for helping humans survive and live well.

Through a growing movement of 1,000 volunteers and partners, we bring thousands of people together each week to share and discuss great novels, short stories and poems. We call this Shared Reading.

We read with schools, families and looked-after-children, adults in community spaces, people in care homes, people with physical and mental health conditions, those coping with or recovering from addiction, and people in the criminal justice system.

Everything we do – from our global Shared Reading movement to the events, activities and social businesses on offer at Calderstones Park in Liverpool – builds warm and lively communities by bringing people together and books to life. It is fantastic to be part of something making a genuine difference to the Woodchurch community. A huge thank you to all who have made this decade of loving literature possible.

Pupils in Year 7 have had their first introduction to William Shakespeare this half term with their study of *Romeo and Juliet*. From the exciting plot to the interesting characters, pupils have enjoyed learning all about this play and exploring the opportunities for drama activities to aid learning. While getting to grips with Shakespeare's language of 'thy' and 'thee', pupils have been learning how to read and respond to extract questions, just like their Year 11 counterparts when writing about *Macbeth*.

Also, Year 7 have been learning about Simon Armitage's poetry. This has been a fantastic outlet for pupils to explore their own ideas about language and develop their analytical skills as they write about their own interpretations of poems such as 'Kid', all about Robin and his vendetta against Batman, and 'I am very bothered' which has made pupils think about actions that they regret from their lives.

Year 8

Blood Brothers has been the focus for year 8 study in English this half term, affording pupils the opportunity to read and act out a popular play set in Liverpool in the 1950s-1980s. Pupils have enjoyed not only learning about the plot and characters, but also the opportunity to study their own accent and dialect. In some classes, pupils have had the chance to embody a character from the play in whole-class readings, and in others pupils have been working hard to dig into the intricacies of the social class system in 20th century Britain.

Pupils worked hard to complete their assessment on *Blood Brothers* and are shifting their attention to non-fiction writing where they will be able to argue their point of view on social issues related to the play, such as teenagers and social class. They will be able to read and debate on controversial topics and have the chance to respond in their own persuasive writing tasks. We look forward to hearing pupils' views and listening to their passionate arguments!

Reasons for Celebration:

Lily Ponsford from Mrs Goaten and Mrs Collinson's class has produced some fantastic work on *Blood Brothers*.

Both teachers would also like to praise Brad Davies for his dedication to his classwork and responding to feedback.



Year 9 pupils this half term have been studying the theme of witchcraft, nature and the supernatural, focusing on reading *The Crucible* by Arthur Miller. Although they have been mostly focused on their analytical writing skills, pupils have also been passionately condemning characters like Abigail and Parris for their manipulation and defending John Proctor and his wife from prejudice. Pupils have also been brushing up on their understanding of drama texts by learning about stage directions and dramatic irony.

As witchcraft is the overall theme of this term for Year 9, pupils will need to transfer their knowledge of attitudes towards witches as they begin their study of Shakespeare's *Macbeth*. Pupils will utilise their knowledge of Shakespeare from Year 8 as they write about how witches are presented in the play, particularly their power over other characters.

Year 10

Different classes in Year 10 this half term have been studying a combination of poetry from the Eduqas anthology and *An Inspector Calls* by J. B. Priestley. Pupils have been tasked to grasp the historical context of each poem and of

the play to ensure they can confidently write about the writer's intentions. With 18 poems to learn before the end of the term, pupils' attendance has been crucial this half term to avoid missing out on important knowledge and similarly with *An Inspector Calls*.

Independent study completed consistently is absolutely essential at this point in Year 10 so that pupils are in routines that will benefit them when they begin Year 11. To aid this, pupils should make constant use of the English Subject Site to watch videos about key characters and themes, and about each individual poem.

Reasons for Celebration:

Lillie-Mae Heenan has created some fantastic *Macbeth* revision to keep up her knowledge of the play.

Pupils in Miss Warrington's class have written some excellent poetry responses this half term, including Tara Clerkin, Maisie Moorhead and Hannah Thompson.



This half term has been perhaps the most important and most rigorous for Year 11 pupils in English as they approach their GCSE exams. Pupils have been creating revision resources, writing practice questions and responding to individual feedback from their teachers, in addition to taking care of their mental health and wellbeing. It is important that pupils revise their Literature knowledge as well as their skills for answering Language questions. By the end of this half term, pupils will have completed all their Literature exams. Well done Year 11 on all your revision and hard work. We wish you the very best with all your exams and for your future endeavours!

Humanities



Year 11 have just started their final exams. To help support with revision, pupils should make use of the subject sites link below where you will find short summary videos of the key learning needed. We have also posted detailed revision support on google classroom. Geography GCSE subject site

Year 10 started looking at ecosystems and have been studying rainforests. Year 9 have started looking at coasts, in this we look how waves shape the coastline and the issues that affect people who live in coastal areas such as the Wirral.

Year 8 are looking at ecosystems and will be looking at how humans impact food webs, the impacts of humans on rainforests and how we can look after our natural world.

Year 7 have started studying tectonics. In this unit we are studying earthquakes and volcanoes, what causes them and how humans have adapted to live with these natural hazards.







Year 11 have now begun their revision preparation for the formal exams. All resources can be found on the Subject Site, including asynchronous videos on how to answer the exam questions. This will be an invaluable resource to all pupils so please do encourage them to access this. Pupils can also contact their teachers for any further support if needed. May we take this time to wish all pupils the very best of luck and every success in their future endeavours.

Year 10 are continuing to work hard on the topic of the Cold War. Pupils must remember that they also need to be revisiting Elizabethan England content at home to ensure this remains fresh in their minds. All resources can be found on the Subject Site. Students will complete the Cold War topic in the final half term and will then move on to Crime and Punishment, which will see a nice change from what has previously been studied.



Year 9 are displaying great commitment to learning, even if they have not opted for History at GCSE. Students will be sitting an assessment on World War One shortly and will then start their final topic on how Hitler got into power. This will prepare them for their GCSEs, both in terms of content, but also skill, so those not continuing with History will also benefit next year.

Year 8 have recently moved onto the Slave Trade and it has been pleasing to hear pupils share their stories about visits to Liverpool's museums or places they have been in the city with links to slavery. Students are displaying a greater understanding of the importance of learning this topic and have shown humility and respect throughout their lessons.



Year 7 have now started the topic of the Tudors and have enjoyed sharing what they already know. There are clearly a lot of Horrible History fans in the year group! They are also working hard at developing their historical skills, building confidence in using sources and interpretations to find out about the past. Well done!

Humanities



This term **Year 7** have started an exciting new unit all about Islam. We are thinking about what it means to be a Muslim, including their Holy Book, place of worship and their beliefs about God. There will also be an opportunity for selected students to go on a trip to the Wirral Deen centre to experience even more about Islam.

Our **Year 8s** have been rising to the challenge this term so far as we have thought about the Holocaust. We have looked at topics such as Persecution, Propaganda, and how Jewish people held on to their faith in the most difficult of circumstances. Students have been able to act and speak with compassion and maturity as we have tackled this sensitive and challenging topic. Next term we'll move on to a whole new faith as we

begin to look at the teachings of Buddhism, exploring the Eightfold Path and the life of the Buddha.

In **Year 9** we have been exploring what happens when faith and courage collide. From Maximilian Kolbe, a Catholic priest who sacrificed his life to save a total stranger in the chambers of Auschwitz; to Malala Yousafzai, a faithful Muslim who championed girls' right to education even when it put her life in danger, we are looking at heroes of faith who have shown exceptional courage and faithfulness in many different situations.

Year 10 are focused on completing paper 2 on Christian Beliefs and Practices, and have been working hard towards their assessment. This term, the brilliant Christian charity Open Doors will be coming in to speak to us about Christian Persecution in the wider world. There will also be a trip for selected students to the Jewish Museum in Manchester.

Our **Year 11** cohort have made a positive start to the GCSE season, and are working incredibly hard. Just one more RS exam to go after half term! Paper 3 on Judaism will be Tuesday the 6th of

June (PM). We are also running a half term revision session for all pupils who wish to benefit from this- it will be on Wednesday 31st May, 12-2pm, and will cover Judaism beliefs and Practices. Good luck to everybody!






Year 7 and 8 Junior Maths Challenge

Year 11 students are preparing for their GCSE exams. The dates of these exams are:

French: Reading and Listening Tuesday 23rd May and Writing Monday 5th June.

Spanish: Reading and Listening Tuesday 6th June and Writing Tuesday 13th June.

To support their progress, pupils can access a range of key grammar and topic resources via our MFL Google Site. One way pupils can challenge themselves at home would be by continuing to revise the 'Hub Phrases', 'Booster Verbs' and the key tenses. Revision materials such as 'Knowledge Organisers' are also available on the MFL Subject Site. Pupils are encouraged to use the condensed knowledge organisers provided for each GCSE 'Theme' and to use these to support their ongoing revision.

- 1. Download the free (and simple to use) language learning app **Duolingo**.
- 2. **BBC.co.uk/languages** select '**Spanish**' in the '**Choose your language box'** then click on '**Mi Vida Loca'** to watch the 22 episodes of the interactive video drama.
- 3. **Quizlet.com** search for **mflwoodchurch**. Scroll down the list of activities to find topic areas to revise. The 'gravity' game is particularly addictive.
- 4. **Teachvid.com** sign up for a free account, watch the language videos and try some of the interactive activities.
- 5. **bbc.co.uk/bitesize** select secondary then KS3 or GCSE, Modern Foreign Languages then either French or Spanish. Quizzes, videos and interactive exercises on a range of topics, including all those at GCSE (we follow the **AQA specification**).
- 6. 'Easy Languages' channel on YouTube select either Easy French or Easy Spanish. Subtitles available in the foreign language and English. Good way to develop listening skills and build a wider range of vocabulary.
- 7. 'Comme une Française' channel on YouTube practise pronunciation, learn phrases on a wide range of topics and improve your knowledge of French culture.

On Monday 27th April, 47 Year 9 pupils visited Plas Dol-Y-Moch, near Blaenau Ffestiniog for a 5 day residential trip in Eryri (Snowdonia National Park).

The pupils completed a variety of activities that challenged them both physically and mentally and demonstrated many of our values, such as endurance, compassion and trust throughout the 5 day trip.

Some of the activities completed were mountaineering, rock climbing/abseiling, underground mine exploration, kayaking, raft building, gorge walking and problem solving.

The pupils were excellent and gained many new skills that will be beneficial for years to come.







Over the past half term Year 7 have begun learning about light and sound. They have investigated why sound requires a medium to travel through and why it travels at different speeds in different states of matter.

They then went on to investigate light travelling at straight lines to explain how shadows form and why light gets dimmer when it moves further from its source.




During this half term Year 7 will continue learning about how light enters the eye to allow us to see and will follow in the footsteps of Sir Isaac Newton when investigating the colours of the visual spectrum when white light is split.

They will then build on previous knowledge from Primary school about food webs when studying their biology topic of interdependence.



Last half term, Year 8 have studied the structure of the Earth to begin learning how rocks are formed and the characteristics of sedimentary, metamorphic and igneous rocks. Pupils investigated the properties of each type and how the cooling rate of magma determines the type of igneous rock formed.







Year 8 have also completed their physics topic of moving by force in which they have built on knowledge of resultant forces from Year 7 to determine speed of objects, from which pupils constructed motion graphs and measured acceleration.

In their biology topic of health and disease, Year 8 have learnt about good health and disease, including the importance of good mental health linked to the well being and mental health support offered by the school.

Year 9

Over the past half term, Year 9 have built on their Year 8 knowledge of interdependence in biology. They have learnt about ecosystem dynamics and the importance of biodiversity. They studied how conservation and sustainability have a role to play in maintaining high biodiversity.






Over the next half term, Year 9 will study the periodic table. They will apply previous learning on elements and compounds to investigate the properties of different groups of elements within the periodic table. This topic will introduce subatomic particle which will lead into the first GCSE unit on atomic structure at the start of Year 10.




In their Biology lessons, Year 10 have been learning about infection and how our immune system responds to pathogens. They have studied different types of pathogen: viruses, bacteria, fungi and protists, including how we can prevent the spread of these pathogens, important lessons for life as well as supporting their GCSE studies.





Chemistry lessons have studied chemical changes, with pupils investigating pH scale, the reactions of acids with bases, carbonates and metals. Over the next half term, pupils will go on to investigate energy changes in reactions to identity reactions as endothermic or exothermic.

In the Physics unit of the Particle Model of Matter, pupils have applied understanding of particles from Key Stage 3 to understand internal energy and carried out the Density GCSE required practical. In their next topic later this term, pupils will begin studying how we have developed our understanding of the atomic structure of atoms through the collaboration of different scientists.



Year 11

Year 11 have come to the end of their Science studies and have begun to prepare for their GCSE examinations. The recent structured revision homework linked directly to the Science Subject Site has not only resulted in a much improved use of the Site but has also led to promising GCSE prediction for many pupils who have shown integrity by making the most of this revision resource available only to pupils at Woodchurch High School.



Year 7

This half term year 7 have begun their Musical theatre topic. Singing in front of your peers can be a daunting thing, especially at High School! Year 8

Year 8 have started to look at Rap and Hip Hop as their next scheme of work. The students are introduced to different styles of rap such as, Scripted, Improvised and Battle to gain a greater understanding of the genre as a whole. The students are not only looking to develop their rapping and songwriting skills but also look into producing their own rap backing track on the production software, Soundtrap.



Year 8 students have already started to creatively explore and impress the Music department with some of their creations so far. Mr Fenney and Mr Payne cannot wait to see some of the finished tracks to be able to demonstrate their musical ability within this topic.





Ed Sheeran once said that, 'writing songs is like running an unused tap. The first few are rubbish, like brown water, but once you have practised it becomes second nature'. Coming from an international superstar- there is no underestimating the songwriting focus of this topic. Despite this challenge, there has been some outstanding work, including Alex Cullen's 'Burger King' song and Sam White's, 'Artist at Work'. Students have been learning how to write lyrics before introducing rhythm and pitch to create a melody, and chords to create an accompaniment. It's been lovely to see a wide variety of topics covered in the lyrical aspect of the unit with many meaningful and intelligent lyrics put together from some groups.



Others students within Year 9 have been dedicated to independently developing their performance skills. One student who has displayed phenomenal endurance is George Sidall who has taken every opportunity to develop his drumming skills The Year 9 cohort continue to impress the Music department with their ability to create, and demonstrate endurance within their Music lessons. We cannot wait to see what they achieve in Key Stage 4!

Year 10

Firstly, a huge congratulations to our Year 10 groups who have now finished their first component of the BTEC, which accounts for 30% of their overall grade. They have have demonstrated excellent subject knowledge within this unit, studying in-depth a wide variety of musical genres. The second aspect of this unit is more practical based with opportunities to explore the theme of discovery within their musical products. Students had to create three 30-60 clips across three disciplines, (Performing, Composition and production). Using a variety of instruments and recording techniques the students across all year 10 classes for Mr Fenney and Mr Payne have impressed us both with their creation skills. Well done!

Year 11

Year 11 have now completely finished their Music course, having submitted their course-work at the start of May. Their exam is to essentially choose a song and a genre of music from a specified list, and then practically create a cover version of that song. We had fantastic submissions across the board, including Reggae versions of 'Don't Look Back in Anger' and a Pop Ballad-esque, 'Don't Stop Believing'. Year 11 demonstrated all skills picked up in their 2 years of time within Music, showing excellent time management and musicianship when creating their products and the Music department are so proud of the finished products that the students have created. Mr Payne and Mr Fenney would like to say again, a massive well done: and wish you all every success for the future!




The Paper Meadow Exhibition
