Synthesia Project - Art Graphics

Year 10 Art Graphics students have been working on a project exploring how we can use mark making in order to create a visual representation of sound. This project was inspired by the artist Melissa McKracken, who has a condition called synthesia that allows her to see sound in marks and colour, which she then recreates in paint on canvas. Pupils have created a series of drawings, 3D wire sculptures, and photography in order to create a visual response to their favourite songs. They then used these photos to create stencils for their screen printing on to their tote bags. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed the project and theory outcomes are all individual and unique.



Art and Design - Louisa Boyd

The Year 10 Art and Design group have been working on their Louisa Boyd inspired Sketchbook.

The final outcome has been a combination of all Assessment Objectives ranging from researching the Artist, developing their skills, working with mixed media materials like quink, watercolours, inks, collograph printing, graphic imagery, taking photos and digital manipulation. The outcome is a concertina style sketchbook, water colour painting and a collograph.



Photography

Year 10 Photographers have manipulated their portrait photos in the style of the Photographer John Rankin. They have experimented with a wide range of materials including, collage, paint, inks and digital manipulation with culminated in a final piece using a materials of their chosen successful experiments.



Primary School Art Festival

Our annual Art festival was a huge success again this year, it took place over the course of 5 days. We welcomed 180 Year 5 pupils from; Prenton Primary, St. Michael's and All Angels, Fender and Townfield. We also had a class in from Foxfield for a morning.

The designer and crafts person William Morris played a big role in inspiring the pupils to create a contextual research board and a clay tile using natural forms such as flowers, leaves and twigs from either their gardens and our school farm.

They loved the opportunity to use clay and creating their amazing outcomes which will be exhibited in Woodchurch High School in September.

Year 11, we look forward to GCSE results day where we will see you reap the rewards of your hard work!


The Reader

Our Reader in Residence, Emma Taylor, has been encouraging the pupils that work with her each week to take an interest in books. Pupils accessing this programme were asked to write a review of their favourite book. Mikey Barlow in Year 9 wrote a review of his favourite book, Heartstopper, which we think is fantastic! Read it below:

Heartstopper is a romance set in a high school. Our central character Nick is

in Year 10 and discovering his identity. I most like volume 2 in the series. I love this book because of the types of romance it covers, which include plenty of homosexual romances. It also includes the kinds of troubles and problems of young people and highlights that you can get through anything with the help of kind and understanding people. Also, it can help and highlights men's mental health. I also like the Heartstopper series because each book picks up from where it left off.

I would gladly recommend this book to all pupils who are interested in queer romance stories of every kind. The book can help in everyday life, encouraging people to speak up about their mental health. It also highlights the idea that you don't know what other people are going through behind closed doors. The main character Nick was struggling with his sexuality at the beginning of this book, but gains the confidence to



come out to his mother and begins to feel more confident to be himself around his new partner, bullies, classmates and staff within his school. It is great to see his self-belief grow.





This half-term, Year 7 have continued their study of Romeo and Juliet and the poetry of Poet Laureate, Simon Armitage. Pupils have particularly enjoyed exploring the different opics of Armitage's poems which, combined with his modern and conversational language, have captured the interest of Year 7. Some pupils have even been writing their own poems based on the theme of conflict, in the style of Armitage. Joshua McDonald has produced some excellent work this half term and Mrs Goaten would like to reward him for his endurance and consistent hard work.

Next year, when Year 7 pupils become Year 8, they will be starting the year with a study of Susan Hill's The Woman in Black. If any pupils want to jump-start their engagement with this topic, an exploration of the English Subject Site is advisable where pupils can access key knowledge about the novel. Also, of course, pupils could spend their summer holidays reading the book or watching the film adaptation!

Year 8

Year 8 has concluded the year with Blood Brothers and non-fiction writing. Pupils have enjoyed learning about the story and characters in Blood Brothers before applying their knowledge of the context and social issues in the play to their own non-fiction writing. In lessons, pupils have been writing about issues, such as child poverty, social



class differences and footballers' salary. Pupils have engaged well with these issues and have relished the opportunity to share their ideas and opinions with their teachers and peers. Miss Warrington's 8XEn5 class wrote interesting articles this half-term about the debate around private schools and the monetary value of education, and did an excellent job in persuading Miss Warrington towards their points of view. Mrs Goaten would like to recognise Brad Davies for his significant improvement in self-confidence in English and also Leo McGuone for his amazing enthusiasm for the subject.

As pupils enter Year 9, they will start by studying John Steinbeck's timeless novel, Of Mice and Men. This study of American literature is something the pupils have not come across yet at Woodchurch so we hope pupils will be excited to read the story and explore the vibrant characters.

Year 10

Throughout the year, Year 10 pupils have been focused on learning about the texts they need for their Literature GCSE - pupils have been working exceptionally hard to commit to memory the plot, characters, contexts and quotations for each text and the 18 different poems they need to know. Humanities

Year 9 have started looking at coasts, in this we look how waves shape the coastline and the issues that affect people who live in coastal areas such as the Wirral

Year 8 are looking at ecosystems and will be looking at how humans impact food webs, the impacts of humans on rainforests and how we can look after our natural world.

Year 7 have started studying tectonics. In this unit we are studying earthquakes and volcanoes, what causes them and how humans have adapted to live with these natural hazards.







Finlie Bell's flag made it to Antarctica!

It was photographed with oceanographer Jon Rosser on board the RRS Discover, which is named after the famous ship that carried Scott and Shackleton on their first trip to Antarctica. Jon is pictured with Finlie's flag in two locations. The first location is near South Georgia, whilst the second is near the A76a iceberg.

Jon is working on the research cruise to try and understand how the waters around Antarctica move, which has big impacts on melting the ice sheets and how much carbon the ocean is able to take up. Whilst Jon was on the ship, he was also able to help out with methane sampling around South Georgia, biological sampling of krill and other sea creatures, and even took water samples around A76a (one of the biggest icebergs in the world!)











Year 11 have now begun their revision preparation for the formal exams. All resources can be found on the Subject Site, including asynchronous videos on how to answer the exam questions. This will be an invaluable resource to all pupils so please do encourage them to access this. Pupils can also contact their teachers for any further support if needed. May we take this time to wish all pupils the very best of luck and every success in their future endeavours.

Year 10 are continuing to work hard on the topic of the Cold War. Pupils must remember that they also need to be revisiting Elizabethan England content at home to ensure this remains fresh in their minds. All resources can be found on the Subject Site. Students will complete the Cold War topic in the final half term and will then move on to Crime and Punishment, which will see a nice change from what has previously been studied.


Year 9 are displaying great commitment to learning, even if they have not opted for History at GCSE. Students will be sitting an assessment on World War One shortly and will then start their final topic on how Hitler got into power. This will prepare them for their GCSEs, both in terms of content, but also skill, so those not continuing with History will also benefit next year.

Year 8 have recently moved onto the Slave Trade and it has been pleasing to hear pupils share their stories about visits to Liverpool's museums or places they have been in the city with links to slavery. Students are displaying a greater understanding of the importance of learning this topic and have shown humility and respect throughout their lessons.

Year 7 have now started the topic of the Tudors and have enjoyed sharing what they already know. There are clearly a lot of Horrible History fans in the year group! They are also working hard at developing their historical skills, building confidence in using sources and interpretations to find out about the past. Well done!

Humanities





This term year 7 have started an exciting new unit all about Islam. We are thinking about what it means to be a Muslim, including their Holy Book, place of worship and their beliefs about God. There will also be an opportunity for selected students to go on a trip to the Wirral Deen centre to experience even more about Islam.

Our Year 8s have been rising to the challenge this term so far as we have thought about the Holocaust. We have looked at topics such as Persecution, Propaganda, and how Jewish people held on to their faith in the most difficult of circumstances. Students have been able to act and speak with compassion and maturity as we have tackled this sensitive and challenging topic. Next term we'll move on to a whole new faith as we begin to look at the teachings of Buddhism, exploring the Eightfold Path and the life of the Buddha.

In year 9 we have been exploring what happens when faith and courage collide. From Maximilian Kolbe, a Catholic priest who sacrificed his life to save a total stranger in the chambers of Auschwitz; to Malala Yousafzai, a faithful Muslim who championed girls' right to education even when it put her life in danger, we are looking at heroes of faith who have shown exceptional courage and faithfulness in many different situations.

Year 10 are focused on completing paper 2 on Christian Beliefs and Practices, and have been working hard towards their assessment. This term, the brilliant Christian charity Open Doors will be coming in to speak to us about Christian Persecution in the wider world. There will also be a trip for selected students to the Jewish Museum in Manchester.

Our Year 11 cohort have made a positive start to the GCSE season, and are working incredibly hard. Just one more RS exam to go after half term! Paper 3 on Judaism was on Tuesday the 6th of June (PM).

Music

Year 7

This half term year 7 have begun their Musical theatre topic. Singing in front your peers can be a daunting thing, especially at High School! However, Mr Fenney

Year 8



Year 8 have started to look at Rap and Hip Hop as their next scheme of work. The students are introduced to different styles of rap such as, Scripted, Improvised and Battle to gain a greater understanding of the genre as a whole. The students are not only looking to develop their rapping and

song writing skills but also look into producing their own rap backing track on the production software, Soundtrap. Year 8 students have already started to creatively explore and impress the Music department with some of their creations so far. Mr Fenney and Mr Payne cannot wait to see some of the finished tracks to be able to demonstrate their musical ability within this topic.

Year 9

Ed Sheeran once said that, 'writing songs is like running an unused tap. The first few are rubbish, like brown water, but once you have practised it becomes second nature'. Coming from an international superstar - there is no underestimating the song writing focus of this topic. Despite this challenge, there has been some outstanding work, including Alex Cullen's 'Burger King' song and Sam White's, 'Artist at Work'. Students have been learning how to write lyrics before introducing rhythm and pitch to create a melody, and chords to create an accompaniment. It's been lovely to see a wide variety of topics covered in the lyrical aspect of the unit with many meaningful and intelligent lyrics put together from some groups.

Performing Arts



Others students within Year 9 have been dedicated to independently developing their performance skills. One student who has displayed phenomenal endurance is George Sidall who has taken every opportunity to develop his drumming skills The Year 9 cohort continue to impress the Music department with their ability to create, and demonstrate endurance within their Music lessons. We cannot wait to see what they achieve in Key Stage 4!



Year 10

Firstly, a huge congratulations to our Year 10 groups who have now finished their first component of the BTEC, which accounts for 30% of their overall grade. They have have demonstrated excellent subject knowledge within this unit, studying in-depth a wide variety of musical genres. The second aspect of this unit is more practical based with opportunities to explore the theme of discovery within their musical products. Students had to create three 30-60 clips across three disciplines, (Performing, Composition and production). Using a variety of instruments and recording techniques the students across all year 10 classes for Mr Fenney and Mr Payne have impressed us both with their creation skills. Well done!

Year 11

Year 11 have now completely finished their Music course, having submitted their coursework at the start of May. Their exam is to essentially choose a song and a genre of music from a specified list, and then practically create a cover version of that song. We had fantastic submissions across the board, including Reggae versions of 'Don't Look Back in Anger' and a Pop Ballad esque, 'Don't Stop Believing'. Year 11 demonstrated all skills picked up in their 2 years of time within Music, showing excellent time management and musicianship when creating their products and the Music department are so





Over the past half term Year 7 have begun learning about light and sound. They have investigated why sound requires a medium to travel through and why it travels at different speeds in different states of matter. They then went on to investigate light travelling at straight lines to explain how shadows form and why

light gets dimmer when it moves further from its source.

During this half term Year 7 will continue learning about how light enters the eye to allow us to see and will follow in the footsteps of Sir Isaac Newton when investigating the colours of the visual spectrum when white light is split.

They will then build on previous knowledge from Primary school about food webs when studying their biology topic of interdependence.


Year 8

Last half term, Year 8 have studied the structure of the Earth to begin

learning how rocks are formed and the characteristics of sedimentary, metamorphic and igneous rocks. Pupils investigated the properties of each type and how the cooling rate of magma determines the type of igneous rock formed.

Year 8 have also completed their physics topic of moving by force in which they have built on knowledge of resultant forces from Year 7 to determine speed of objects, from which pupils constructed motion graphs and measured acceleration.







In their biology topic of health and disease, Year 8 have learnt about good health and disease, including the importance of good mental health linked to the well being and mental health support offered by the school.



Over the past half term, Year 9 have built on their Year 8 knowledge of interdependence in biology. They have learnt about ecosystem dynamics and the importance of biodiversity. They studied how conservation and sustainability have a role to play in maintaining high biodiversity.






Over the next half term, Year 9 will study the periodic table. They will apply previous learning on elements and compounds to investigate the properties of different groups of elements within the periodic table. This topic will introduce subatomic particle which will lead into the first GCSE unit on atomic structure at the start of Year 10.

Year 10


In their Biology lessons, Year 10 have been learning about infection and how our immune system responds to pathogens. They have studied different types of pathogen: viruses, bacteria, fungi and protists, including how we can prevent the spread of these pathogens, important lessons for life as well as supporting their GCSE studies.





Chemistry lessons have studied chemical changes, with pupils investigating pH scale, the reactions of acids with bases, carbonates and metals. Over the next half term, pupils will go on to investigate energy changes in reactions to identity reactions as endothermic or exothermic.

In the Physics unit of the Particle Model of Matter, pupils have applied understanding of particles from Key Stage 3 to understand internal energy and carried out the Density GCSE required practical. In their next topic later this term, pupils will begin studying how we have developed our un-



derstanding of the atomic structure of atoms through the collaboration of different scientists.

The assessor spoke with staff, parents and pupils about the school's inclusivity and how all pupils are welcome in our community and are supported and cared for.


