The pupils are absolutely loving this project and the proof is in their very creative outcomes. Well done Year 10!






Year 10 Fine Artists share their inspiration!

Pupils have worked creatively to develop their own Research Boards, annotating information about the artists and giving their own personal opinions of the artist's work!




Year 11 Art Textiles. Secrets of the Ocean




In January, students will begin looking at non-fiction writing with a focus on nature and the environment. Students will have the opportunity to engage with speeches by Greta Thunberg in the context of the power of speeches to enact social reform. Students have access to the subject site to assist their learning, which they are encouraged to use for any support with homework, or opportunities to consolidate their learning.

Year 8

Throughout term two, Year 8 have been working exceptionally hard finishing their study of Hill's gothic novel, *The Woman in Black*. Mr Power would like to particularly praise Zack Hughes who, since the start of the Autumn term, has made excellent progress in his studies - keep up the good work Zack!

As the term has progressed, Year 8 have tracked and analysed how Hill has created and built up tension throughout her story at the different stages of the narrative and have used such ideas and techniques when writing their own narratives alongside their study of the set text. Students have especially enjoyed reading Hill's ending or resolution where plot twists have been finally revealed to us as readers, inspiring pupils' ideas when concluding their own narratives themselves. Miss Gooding would like to specifically congratulate Mia-Elise Williams this term for her enthusiastic participation in class and excellent effort in independent practice in lessons when constructing stories and analysing the text.

Pupils will be using all ideas and techniques explored throughout the term so far in preparation for their upcoming narrative writing assessment. To further prepare for this, pupils should access the Subject Site to ensure they are confident in their narrative writing skills and writing stories with underlying tension.



Next term, Year 8 will be starting their Shakespeare studies - in particular, Much Ado About Nothing. To be as prepared as they possibly can, students are recommended to watch the film over their Christmas break to start building up their knowledge of the play beforehand.

Year 9

As the Autumn term has progressed, Year
9 students have finalised their
comprehensive reading study of Of Mice
and Men and To Kill a Mockingbird and
have moved onto a narrative writing focus.
Students have used an array of poetry as
stimuli for their narrative writing, including
Thomas Hardy's 'A Wife in London' and
Rupert Brooke's 'The Soldier', and have
shown excellent effort and progress in their
independent practice. Miss Gooding would

To conclude this term, students have completed a final assessment wherein they have written a narrative using a range of techniques that they have studied over the course of their high school career, such as tension techniques studied in the Year 8 The Woman in Black and descriptive writing techniques in the Year 7 Oliver Twist syllabus. Throughout this term, Mr Power has identified that Lucy Allen has been consistently working hard, both with the reading and narrative writing elements of Language, and that Amelia Clayton's constant positive energy and enthusiasm for English has led to significant progress in the subject.

Next half term, Year 9 will be studying Robert Swindells' Stone Cold wherein they will revisit how to approach a contemporary Literature question, building on their knowledge from the Year 8 Blood Brothers syllabus. As always, students should access the Subject Site to support their independent revision and are encouraged to talk to their teachers for any support, guidance or advice whenever needed.

Year 10

During Autumn 2, Year 10 have continued their studies around Macbeth, completing the play in its entirety and delving deeply into the complexities of both the play itself and the Jacobean context in which it was written. Students have worked well to learn quotations and embed these into their written work to fully meet the requirements of the Literature mark scheme. Ms Topham and Miss Smethurst would like to congratulate Lyla Proctor, Sienna Atherton and Mackenzie Wooley for their continued effort and dedication to their studies of English, and the outstanding work that they have consequently produced when answering Macbeth essay questions.

In order to support their independent learning, students have been using the Subject Site appropriately and effectively to support their revision. Miss Wilson would like to highlight Daisy Sutton's achievements in this area as she has prepared excellent revision notes to support her independent study and utilised these effectively to write a fabulous Banquo essay. Additionally, both Joe Davies and Keeley Ormond have demonstrated an incredible effort with regards to their GCSE English studies, consistently seeking out additional revision resources and support so that they can make as much progress as possible! In order for students to continue to thrive with their independent learning, Miss Smethurst has created a series of videos, called Literature Shorts, which are accessible on the English Subject Site. These videos are 5 minute long revision resources which guide students through independent learning and provide support with regards to themes, plot, character development and context. Students can use these in addition to the KPLC to support their understanding of Macbeth.

Finally, students have demonstrated endurance through their Centre Assessed Examinations, showing the depth of their understanding and analysis skills. As students move into the next half term, the skills which they have honed throughout the Autumn term will be transferred into the next programme of learning: Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol.



Year 11

This term, Year 11 have continued with their English Language studies, moving on to exploring Component 2, non-fiction reading and writing, studying various text types that are written with a specific purpose and for a particular audience. Miss Blackwell has been especially impressed with Lexi-May Barker-Wellings and Evelyn Williams' commitment to learning this term and their dedication towards their English studies. Such dedication has also been shown by Year 11 collectively with their consistent participation in Period 6, showing great progress overall, especially for their additional study and independent learning in preparation for their upcoming GCSEs. Miss Wilson would also like to celebrate Abigail Charlton's fantastic personal story that she has created - simply amazing work, keep it up! Miss Warrington has been impressed with 11YEn2's engagement with their Spoken Language assessment, especially Alexandra Wallace and Leo Campbell for their engagement with serious topics.

Geography



History

We have been continuing to develop some of our new units in History at Woodchurch over the past half term.

Year 7 have begun studying a unit all about Medieval Britain, focusing on how powerful monarchs were in the Middle Ages, and how that impacted the people of England.

Year 8 have been learning about how power shifted away from monarchs in the period 1500-1750 towards parliament and the people.

Year 9 have been finding out about how the industrial revolution led to a mass migration of people from the countryside to the towns in Britain, and the impact this had on peoples' working and living conditions.

Students have responded well to these units in class.

Our Subject Site is under review and gradually, more and more of our Site will be populated with material for our Key Stage Three learners. In the meantime, there are a vast array of wonderful resources for Key Stage Three on BBC Bitesize, which pupils should use to further their independent learning.



History

GCSE

Years 10 and 11 have continued to study the development of medicine in Britain between c.1250 and the present day. After Christmas we will be completing this unit and moving on to our second unit on Germany 1918-1939.

Our Subject Site for Key Stage Four is being developed all of the time, and we are now happy to report that all materials under the GCSE section are relevant to our current exam board and topics, so pupils should feel confident to use this to access a whole host of learning materials with which to study beyond the classroom.

Ideas to support learning even further

There are a whole range of really fantastic things that you could be doing as a family to support independent learning at home. Some examples are here:-

Modern Languages Subject Site

On the Modern Languages Subject Site, pupils can find knowledge organisers for each topic, grammar video explanations and topic videos to support their revision for exams. Class teachers will have shown pupils where resources are on the website, but pupils should ask their class teacher if they need any support accessing resources!



If you feel that you would like to refresh your language skills in small chunks, you may want to try some of these suggested activities. Just 5-10 minutes a day of practising language skills will make recalling vocabulary a lot easier!

- 2. **BBC.co.uk/languages** select 'Spanish' in the 'Choose your language box' then click on 'Mi Vida Loca' to watch the 22 episodes of the interactive video drama.
- 3. **Quizlet.com** search for mflwoodchurch. Scroll down the list of activities to find topic areas to revise. The 'gravity' game is particularly addictive.
- 4. **Teachvid.com** sign up for a free account, watch the language videos and try some of the interactive activities.
- 5. **bbc.co.uk/bitesize** select secondary then KS3 or GCSE, Modern Foreign Languages then either French or Spanish. Quizzes, videos and interactive exercises on a range of topics, including all those at GCSE (we follow the AQA specification).
- 6. **'Easy Languages'** channel on YouTube select either Easy French or Easy Spanish. Subtitles available in the foreign language and English. Good way to develop listening skills and build a wider range of vocabulary.
- 7. **'Comme une Française'** channel on YouTube practise pronunciation, learn phrases on a wide range of topics and improve your knowledge of French culture.
- 8. 'Agencia ELE' channel on YouTube Spanish videos on a range of GCSE topics. Subtitles can be turned off and on through the settings button at the bottom of the video screen.
- 9. **1 jour 1 actu.com** current affairs website aimed at young, native speakers of French.
- 10. **Lyricstraining.com** no need to set up a free account. Practise listening skills by completing gap fill exercises on French or Spanish songs. (Start with 'Beginner' and 'Choice mode'.


Science Club

Our year 8 biologists have been exploring the process behind life creation. Through engaging discussions and respectful conversations, our students have demonstrated a commendable level of maturity.



Students started right at the beginning with how life begins at fertilisation all the way up to puberty. We were then able to link this to the exciting news of a new endangered eastern black rhino calf being born at Chester Zoo.

100% Club

Year 7 and Year 8 students have been learning about artificial intelligence during their 100% club assemblies this half term. Through an interactive presentation, they explored how AI can be used positively for fields such as medicine development. The government is trying to regulate it to keep us safe.



Year 9



Our year 9 scientists have been introduced to the astonishing variety of species and ecosystems that make up our planet. We have had thought provoking discussions about preserving biodiversity, understanding the delicate balance between different organisms and recognising the impact of human activities on the natural world.

Year 10

Year 10 have sat their first GCSE style exam papers in the examination hall over this half term. To prepare for this, many pupils have engaged with the online revision planner that included completing additional Educake quizzes to test their understanding of all topics taught so far this year. Attendance at revision sessions, both in person and asynchronous online revision has been very positive as Year 10 continue to embrace their learning.

In Biology lessons pupils have begun to learn about the organisation of organs and organ systems beginning with the digestive system and another required practical: this time testing foods for different nutrients.



Chemistry lessons have moved onto bonding where pupils are applying their learning of atomic structure to understand how elements react to form compounds.

In Physics lessons pupils have begun to study electricity, learning how current is the flow of charge and how resistance is affected by the length of a wire in their first resistance required practical.

Year 11

In the New Year our Year 11 pupils will be sitting their Centre Assessment

Examination which will be a complete GCSE paper 1 for each of Biology,

Chemistry and Physics. To support them in their preparation for these assessments they have been following a ten week long revision planner which has broken all of the topics required into manageable chunks for their revision.





Whilst the pupils have revised independently at home, new learning to prepare for paper 2 has continued in Science lessons. In Biology the pupils have completed the homeostasis topic and have begun to study inheritance and the genome to learn how DNA influences our characteristics.

In Chemistry lessons pupils have learnt how hydrocarbons from crude oil are separated into products such as petrol, diesel and kerosene through fractional distillation and cracking.

In Physics pupils are near to the end of the Forces topic, investigating acceleration using the frictionless air track for their required practical and learning factors that affect braking distance- learning that should stay with them throughout their life.

Students are continuing to impress science staff with their dedication to their Educake homework and are noticing a huge improvement in their understanding of concepts in lessons.

Collective Worship

As we approach Christmas, we reflect on what we have looked at in our Collective Worship this term, and the wonderful things that have taken place.

In November, we lived out the Christian Value of compassion through our Harvest Collection when items were collected for CAP Wirral. Christians Against Poverty work with people who are struggling with debt, and our harvest donations enabled the CAP team to put together over 40 Christmas Hampers, which were gratefully received by their clients and their families.

As we've approached Christmas, our Collective Worship has been focused on the real meaning of Christmas. As we approach Christmas we will all be thinking about different things; but whatever we might be thinking about, most people agree that presents are a big part of Christmas. We've been thinking about the gifts we might give and receive if we were in heaven's living room.

With you I am well pleased."
