Year 7

As pupils in Year 7 entered their second term at Woodchurch High School, their work in English changed from a fiction to a non-fiction focus. Pupils have been learning about issues within nature and the environment, including farming, endangered animals and the impact of humans on climate change. Some classes took this opportunity to visit the school farm and engage with the animals and farmers to learn how the animals are cared for effectively. Pupils have then used all their new knowledge to write persuasive speeches, articles and letters to convince people of authority to help protect animals and the environment and campaign for change.



Year 8

This term, the Year 8 English curriculum has seen a split study between Shakespeare's Much Ado About Nothing and Unseen Poetry. The play's themes of love and the relationships between the main characters have seamlessly complemented the relationships explored within a series of unseen poems and pupils have been able to make these links successfully whilst studying both elements of the programme. Students have studied the likes of renowned poets such as Heaney and Armitage, and have grasped the approach to writing a personal response to such poems thoughtfully. We are extremely impressed with how Year 8 have taken to this challenge and explored a variety of poems that they have never read, seen or studied before.

Year 8 will continue to analyse both extracts from the play and unseen poems to prepare them for their assessment after our half-term break. Students should ensure they visit the English Subject Site in order to best prepare and revise for their upcoming and fast-approaching CAEs in the hall.

Year 9

Moving into the Spring term, Year 9 have maintained their Language focus but have shifted from fiction to non-fiction.

Continuing with the themes of conflict and marginalisation which were explored in the Autumn term, students have delved into and explored the rhetoric of influential figures from history, including Nora Ephron, Martin Luther King and Harvey Milk.



Students have been tasked with considering the emotional impact that these key figures have had upon their audiences, and carefully deciphered the purpose and intent behind their words. Both Miss Barney and Miss Calder would like to congratulate Willow Brookshaw and Millie McKenzie on their excellent engagement with and mature attitude towards this term's topics. Furthermore, Elyse Orford has been highlighted by Ms Topham for exploring Martin Luther King's speech in a unique and thoughtful manner, and Hannah Sharkey has created outstanding and thoughtful responses for both Martin Luther King's 'I Have a Dream' and Emmeline Pankhurst's speech on women's rights. Miss Smethurst would like to recognise Ben Wilkinson's compassion when reading and responding to these influential speeches.

In the second half of the Spring term, students will utilise their understanding of what makes an effective speech from the first term in order to inform their ability to write a speech. Upon completion of their speeches, students will perform their speeches to the class, using their knowledge of how to be an effective speaker which has been encouraged throughout their Woodchurch career through the acronym 'SHAPE'. Students will use the feedback from their teachers to inform their areas of development prior to their GCSE Speaking exams in subsequent years.



Year 10

Year 10 have had an excellent start to the New Year and have shown great enthusiasm for A Christmas Carol in preparation for their GCSE English Literature qualification. As the term has progressed, students have been steadily working through the staves, taking great care in their consideration of characterisation, plot and structure. Students have also demonstrated excellent recall of their long term memory through their consideration of context when exploring the historical context of the Industrial Revolution and Victorian England, drawing upon their knowledge from topics previously studied in History and during Key Stage 3, specifically when studying Oliver Twist. As a department, we would like to congratulate Year 10 on their endurance this term and on the completion of not their assessment. Miss Barney would also like to highlight the excellent independent work that Yan Yin Liu has produced for her homework this term - great work!

As they progress into Spring 2, students will continue through their Literature syllabus by delving into the Eduqas Anthology of poetry, looking at a range of works from Thomas Hardy to Seamus Heaney. Within this study of poetry, students will be encouraged to explore a range of contextual time frames, poetic intent and structural forms. In order to take a proactive approach to their learning over the half term break, students can access the English Subject Site in order to learn about Romanticism and the Romantic poets, specifically poets such as William Blake, William Wordsworth, Lord Byron, Percy Shelley and John Keats.

Year 11

To begin with, the English department would like to offer a massive congratulations to all of Year 11 on completing their English Language

Centre Assessed Examinations at the start of Spring 1. Students worked incredibly hard in the lead up to their examinations, showing their dedication in both lessons and Period 6. Miss Warrington's class even created and delivered presentations on the different themes in Macbeth to inform their revision and this proved an extremely useful task and point of recall. We are confident that all pupils will continue with their efforts and hard work as their GCSEs are fast approaching.

As we progress into Spring 2, students' focus will be shifting towards English Literature as they prepare to complete more Centre Assessed Examinations. Students should continue their revision within lessons, but also independently outside of the classroom. Miss Blackwell would like to particularly praise Lexi-May Barker Wellings for her continued engagement within her English studies.

Geography

Year 11

Year 11 have just completed their centre bases assessment, pupils should use feedback from these exams to identify any gaps in their understanding in the final 9 weeks till the final exams start. Year 7

Year 7 have started one world seven continents inspired by the David Attenborough series which can be found here (BBC). In this the pupils will apply the skills gained in the last unit to learn about how each continent is unique and what are the major issues facing it and apply their problem solving skills to tackle issues such as immigration from Mexico to USA, the trans Amazonian highway, Tourism in Antarctica, wildfires in Australia and Tsunamis in Asia. History

Our Year 10 and 11 History pupils have started their final topic on Weimar and Nazi Germany - one they've been looking forward to studying in many cases, since they opted. We hope they will find the subjects as engaging and interesting as we do! Year 11 have been fortunate to have a History 'drop down day' this month, as we build upon prior learning in Year 10 to revisit some tricky topics in our Cold War Unit.

Key Stage Three pupils have begun some of our brand new units in History this half term. Year 7 are learning about why it was so difficult to be a medieval monarch - facing battles with The Church for power, a murder on their hands, stubborn barons, an epidemic and a rebellion!

Year 8 have begun a unit called How and why did Britain turn from green to grey?' learning about the changes of the industrial revolution. In it they will learn about how and why life changed for people as well as how Britain's place in the world changed as they became the world's leading economy and ultimately, built the biggest empire the world had ever seen.

Year 9 have really been enjoying their new topic on 'What's Franz got to do with Tommy from Woodchurch Road?' as they delve into the difficulties and horrors of trench warfare in World War One.



Religious Studies

Year 7

Year 7 have started their unit looking into the life of Jesus. In lessons they have been exploring the details of Mark's Gospel and the miraculous accounts of Jesus such as His birth, baptism, crucifixion, and the miracles He performed. Many Year 7 pupils accumulated on a trip to the local Holy Cross Church, where they explored the different features of the Church, played a part in baptising the special guest 'Ted', and some of them even took on the role of a priest and stood up on the pulpit to read aloud Biblical extracts. Year 7 pupils can continue their independent study by accessing the <u>Subject Site</u>

Year 8

Year 8 have started working through their new unit which teaches them all about Judaism. Within this unit, Year 8 have been exploring Jewish beliefs and practices such as the nature of God, Jewish festivals, Jewish laws, the afterlife, and the founders of Judaism. Many pupils accumulated on a trip to Chester Cathedral where they met and listened to Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines MBE give an extraordinary account of her life as a Holocaust survivor and how she was rescued via the Kindertransport. Pupils also got to participate in exciting workshops which resulted in them being able to tell the exceptional life story of Anne Frank. Year 8 pupils can continue their independent study by accessing the

Year 9

Year 9 have begun looking into Christian responses to evil and suffering. In lessons, they explore what are considered to be different accounts of evil and why they happen. This has provided them with the opportunity to think philosophically to answer big questions like, 'If God is all loving and has the power to stop or prevent evil and suffering, then why doesn't He?'. They have been looking into the Biblical accounts of Adam and Eve and the fall of mankind, the story of Job to represent suffering being a test of faith, and much more. Year 9 pupils can continue their independent study by accessing the <u>Subject Site</u>

Religious Studies

Year 10

Year 10 are continuing to work through the unit on Christian Beliefs. Within lessons they have been looking deeply into Biblical accounts which give reason as to why Christians have their beliefs. They have been exploring the accounts of Jesus in detail and exploring why He is the centre of Christian belief.

For example, pupils have been diving into the accounts of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection, his ascension and incarnation, and how all of this led to salvation.

Year 11

Year 11 have been continuing to look at Jewish practices. Here they have been exploring the different Jewish festivals and why they take place. For example, Hanukkah, Rosh Hashanah, and Passover. They should continue to work hard and complete independent study using the Site in preparation for their exams, and they will all prevail!

Pupils in Year 11 who participate in the ASDAN course have been looking into the different things or people that cause people to be inspired. In lessons, they have been exploring how different settings in nature can inspire people just like religious buildings. Similarly, they have been researching religious role models and celebrities who inspire people

Modern Languages Subject Site

On the Modern Languages Subject Site, pupils can find knowledge organisers for each topic, grammar video explanations and topic videos to support their revision for exams. Class teachers will have shown pupils where resources are on the website, but pupils should ask their class teacher if they need any support accessing resources!



If you feel that you would like to refresh your language skills in small chunks, you may want to try some of these suggested activities. Just 5-10 minutes a day of practising language skills will make recalling vocabulary a lot easier!

- 1. Download the free (and simple to use) language learning app **Duolingo**.
- 2. **BBC.co.uk/languages** select 'Spanish' in the 'Choose your language box' then click on 'Mi Vida Loca' to watch the 22 episodes of the interactive video drama.
- 3. **Quizlet.com** search for mflwoodchurch. Scroll down the list of activities to find topic areas to revise. The 'gravity' game is particularly addictive.
- 4. **Teachvid.com** sign up for a free account, watch the language videos and try some of the interactive activities.
- 5. **bbc.co.uk/bitesize** select secondary then KS3 or GCSE, Modern Foreign Languages then either French or Spanish. Quizzes, videos and interactive exercises on a range of topics, including all those at GCSE (we follow the AQA specification).
- 6. **'Easy Languages'** channel on YouTube select either Easy French or Easy Spanish. Subtitles available in the foreign language and English. Good way to develop listening skills and build a wider range of vocabulary.
- 7. **'Comme une Française'** channel on YouTube practise pronunciation, learn phrases on a wide range of topics and improve your knowledge of French culture.
- 8. 'Agencia ELE' channel on YouTube Spanish videos on a range of GCSE topics. Subtitles can be turned off and on through the settings button at the bottom of the video screen.
- 9. **1 jour 1 actu.com** current affairs website aimed at young, native speakers of French.
- 10. **Lyricstraining.com** no need to set up a free account. Practise listening skills by completing gap fill exercises on French or Spanish songs. (Start with 'Beginner' and 'Choice mode'.

We're looking forward to working with Year 9 in their final term and beyond for those choosing drama next year.



Year 10


Year 10 students have made a fantastic start to their GCSE studies in Drama this year. Year 10 spent the first term exploring a range of theatre practitioners such as Stanislavski, Artaud, Brecht and Berkoff, all of which have influenced what theatre and performance looks like to us today. Year 10 spent time working on scripted performance as well as devising, utilising the styles and rehearsal techniques pioneered by a specific practitioner. This was a challenging module for pupils, however they demonstrated excellent endurance and resilience and remained open-minded about the possibilities of drama. Year 10 developed excellent collaboration and communication skills during the Autumn Term.

Drama

Year 10

Year 10 then went on to start exploring our first GCSE text called 'DNA' by Dennis Kelly. It's a play about a group of teenagers, who could be described as a 'gang', who have accidentally killed one of their classmates. When they realise the terrible mistake they have made, they try to cover up this crime, but inadvertently implicate an innocent man in the process. Year 10 were challenged to perform scripted extracts from the play and have demonstrated their knowledge and understanding of the context the play is set in. Year 10 have also been using this text to practise Component 3 exam style questions in readiness for their Year 11 studies. Year 10 have shown an excellent commitment and drive to achieve this term and have tackled the theoretical side of the course with enthusiasm.

Year 10 will now begin to explore their first practical GCSE graded Component 1 devised project after half term and we are looking forward to seeing the pupils work collaboratively to develop their performances.



Drama

Year 11

This term, Year 11 have been exploring their solo and partnered performances from extracts of plays in readiness for their Component 2 GCSE exam after half term. Year 11 have been exploring characterisation and artistic intention in scripted performance and have enjoyed working on a range of contemporary texts. Year 11 students have shown their talent and potential in this component and have demonstrated their outstanding performance skills in their mock exams and in-class rehearsals.

This term has also been challenging for Year 11 pupils as we have also been practising and learning the approach to the Component 3 written exam with a focus on the set text 'An Inspector Calls' by J.B Priestley. 'An Inspector Calls' is a play that revolves around the apparent suicide of a young woman called Eva Smith. In the play, the unsuspecting Birling family are visited by the mysterious Inspector Goole. He arrives just as they are celebrating the engagement of Sheila Birling to Gerald Croft.

Year 11 have shown real endurance and motivation to achieve this term and have engaged in extra provision such as Period 6 and lunchtime drop-in rehearsals, showing their commitment and drive towards their studies. Many of our Year 11 Drama pupils have been successful at gaining places at college and many have been offered auditions at prestigious Drama Schools such as Liverpool Media Academy and LIPA. Congratulations to Year 11 and their hard work and good luck for your final graded exam components after half term!

Music

Year 7



During this half-term Year 7 have begun to explore how the rhythm work from last term fuses with pitch to create a melody. The wisdom that students have shown regarding rhythm has meant that they have adapted to reading the musical stave incredibly well. They are enjoying working on the keyboards, with many showing a natural affinity for Music. Mr Payne and Mr Fenney are incredibly pleased with not only their musical progress this half term but also their endurance with such challenging content. Students who wish to practise further should join us on Monday Lunchtimes in Music 1 for full access to all of the instruments and to receive additional support.

Year 8

Year 8 have started to study the Blues, focusing on an answer to the question: Is it acceptable to study music which has a dark history? They have responded maturely to this topic and have become confident in playing the 12 Bar Blues chord progression. We have been really impressed with the knowledge shown by Year 8 in exploring the Blues Scale, which uses parts of the keyboard we haven't yet used! It is important that they show endurance as we move towards exploring our Blues assessment piece which is based around three, challenging riffs.

Year 9

Over the last half-term Year 9 pupils have been studying Songwriting. Year 9 have really developed their skills in the different areas of songwriting such as, writing lyrics, creating a melody or riff and composing their own chord progression. It has been so lovely to see year 9 composing their own Music and creating their own sound through this unit providing students with the opportunity to compose music on a range of instruments such as keyboards, guitar, ukulele and vocals. Year 9 are due to take their options soon and its so exciting to discuss with pupils the possibility of them taking music into year 10. Year 9 have shown a real interest in music beyond year 9 and the Music department is so excited to see the next wave of musicians coming into key stage 4.

Music

Year 10

This half-term Year 10 have continued to make excellent progress on their BTEC course. Year 10 are currently preparing for their first coursework submission looking into different genres of Music studied in lessons and practically exploring these on their chosen instruments. Year 10 have shown real endurance and resilience during our Music lessons asking important questions to clarify their knowledge and exploring aspects of Music in a challenging way. Year 10 continually impress the Music department with their contributions both inside and outside of lessons contributing to the performing arts community is a very positive way.




Year 11


Drama Club








This graph shows the relationship between





Many of our Y11 pupils have had interviews with a range of Post 16 providers Well done to all of those pupils who have been offered places! For those pupils who have not yet made an application to an apprenticeship provider, further education college or school sixth form provider, it is vital that applications are made to secure a place of their choice, as soon as possible. School staff are available to help with any applications that children wish to make.

There have been a variety of providers who have visited school over the past few weeks. There have been lunchtime drop in sessions from Wirral Met, Cheshire College and Reaseheath College. The latter have also presented in assembly to Y11 pupils. There has also been a focused group talk around applications to the Armed Forces.

National Apprenticeship week was this month and local employers have held apprenticeship open evenings. Pupils were made aware of the various opportunities on offer and how to book a place, in order to be involved in the scheme.

Cards of Hope

Some of our Year 8 pupils shared some love and kindness with the local community on Valentines Day, as part of their Archbishop of York Award by giving out cards of hope. It was a lovely afternoon and the pupils received so many comments of gratitude from people who really valued receiving them. One lady commented that after the passing of her husband, she didn't think she'd get a card this year but she was delighted to have received one.









Collective Worship

In Collective Worship this half term we have been thinking about the film Amazing Grace, which tells the story of William Wilberforce and others, who campaigned for many years for the slave trade to be abolished in Britain. Over the last few weeks we have considered the ambition and the courage of the men and women who campaigned and lobbied for the abolition of slavery. We thought about the importance of encouraging our friends to make right decisions, and to push us to push ourselves. We learned that for most issues sympathy and pity won't make a difference, that things change when we take action; we learned from the Bible that our beliefs have to be represented by our actions, "What good is it if someone claims to have faith but does nothing about it? Faith by itself, if not accompanied by action, is dead." And we thought about the realities of injustice around slavery in the late 1700s, during which time Britain still dominated the transportation of slaves overseas despite slavery becoming illegal in England in 1772. William Wilberforce spoke out reminded people of the time that God made men equal; and whether we have much or little in common with those who are suffering in slavery, they are as valuable, precious and important as each of us.

In the final week of our series we learned about slavery today. Despite the abolition of slavery in 1807, there are more than 40 million slaves scattered all over the world today, including more than 10,000 people trapped in slavery in the UK. Today, the Slave Trade isn't as blatant as it was in Wilberforce's time; there are lots of different terms used to describe it, including "human trafficking". Traffickers manipulate, lie and deceive young men and women into paying for what they believe to be a new opportunity to study or get a job, but then steal them from their homes and families and force them to work against their will, doing awful jobs under terrible conditions. This is not the way people are meant to live – this is not the justice that Wilberforce and others were striving for. This is not how God intended for mankind to live. It's easy for us to be ignorant to the injustice and evil in the world because it can be far from home, or because we are desensitised by receiving too much information; but God wants us to be there for, and stand alongside, people who are broken-hearted, and to strive towards release for people who don't have their own freedom.

Collective Worship

One of the charities that we are supporting this year is International Justice Mission (IJM), a global organisation that protects people in poverty from violence by rescuing victims, bringing criminals to justice, restoring survivors to safety and strength, and helping local law enforcement build a safe future that lasts. Children, women and men face the reality of modern slavery, exploitation and abuse every day because people in power prey on the vulnerabilities that poverty creates. IJM is on a mission to partner with local communities to build a more just world where everyone can expect to be safe and protected. They believe that hope in action is the most powerful force in the world, and with it, justice is unstoppable.

Coming up at St Mary's Church next half term, we have All Age Services at 10:30am on the first Sunday of the month, with themes taken from Pixar movies – on Sunday 3rd March we're using Cars. During Lent, we are using the Narnia stories by CS Lewis as a theme for our services, with a film night on Saturday 23rd March when we'll watch The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe, and special services on Palm Sunday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday.
